Jobs in an era of automation

Technology is all around us, from the smartphone in your pocket to the driverless vehicle you might soon come across on your way to work. Driven by increased digitization, artificial intelligence, advanced robotics and countless other innovations, technology has become more capable than ever before, and we're only scratching the surface of what is possible.


In the wake of rapid technological progress, the Fourth Industrial Revolution is bound to transform the world in which we live and work. While automation promises to generate tremendous value, it comes with challenges and questions about its impact on jobs, skills and the relevance of the human worker. This research explores these questions, discussing the potential for automation of occupations and industries in Belgium and the skills of the future.

Technical side note

We introduce the first model that quantifies the impact of modern technology on the Belgian labor market. It is based on a one-of-a-kind dataset of detailed profiles of all Belgian occupations, compiled specifically for the purpose of this thesis. Each occupation is scored on a set of variables (e.g. dexterity, creativity, etc.). Additionally, these profiles include information on wages, education, number of workers, etc. Using a bagged tree model, we quantified the potential for automation of Belgian occupations. Furthermore, we determined what features most significantly influence automation potential using advanced statistical methods.

Automation and the Belgian labor market

Many of the tasks that workers carry out today could be performed better and more cheaply by automation technologies. Just under half (47%) of all Belgian workers are employed in occupations with a high potential for automation.



Occupations that are routine, consist largely of basic cognitive skills or have a significant physical component, such as clerical support workers or plant machine operators, are most susceptible to automation. These 2 classes alone represent over 700.000 jobs that could potentially be automated, over 15% of the Belgian labor force. Perhaps more surprisingly, a

considerable share of service occupations, which experienced substantial job growth over the past decades, have a high automation potential.

Automation will have a lesser effect on jobs involving elaborate people skills and creativity, such as managers or graphic designers. They will likely see themselves complemented by technology. These findings are supported by a downward trend in employment in high-risk occupational groups (e.g. a 10% decrease in clerical workers since 2013), while the number of jobs in low-automation potential occupations increased by roughly 5% over the same period.

Overall, over 50% of jobs in Belgium in their present form could potentially be automated using current technology. The following table summarizes these results:

It's important to note that these findings are representative of occupations as they are currently defined. A changing task composition within existing occupations could affect these results, as occupations adapt to automation and workers focus on skills that machines cannot adequately provide.

Shifting skill requirements

As new automation technologies are introduced to the workplace, some occupations will decline, some will grow, but all will change to some extent. Workers will spend more time on those tasks that technology is not yet capable of, and demand for workforce skills will shift. Over 40% of skills required today are set to change substantially over the next 5 years.


Our research shows that physical and manual-, along with basic cognitive and technical skills are associated with a high automation potential, as technology has largely matched or surpassed their human counterparts in this field. Demand for these skills will stagnate, and eventually decline.

It are the inherently human skills such as social- and emotional intelligence, creativity and communication that remain the hardest to automate. The single most significant factor to automation potential was found to be originality; the ability to come up with unusual or clever ideas about a given topic or situation, or to develop creative ways to solve a problem. These types of skills, along with the advanced technical skills that complement automation technologies, will be the core of value offered by the workforce and will experience a strong growth in demand. Occupations leveraging these skills (e.g. managers, psychologists) generally have a low potential for automation and are likely to experience positive net occupational growth.

Ensuring that workers have the right skills and support to transition towards new jobs might prove to be the central challenge of Fourth Industrial Revolution. Workers will need to adapt continuously. Should they fail to do so, unemployment can be expected to increase, and we might fail to capture the full benefit of automation.

Income and education

The model provides evidence that wages and educational attainment have a strong negative correlation to potential for automation. The oncoming wave of automation will thus favor



highly skilled workers in currently high-wage positions, displacing workers on the other end of the distribution. This is in sharp contrast to the Computer Revolution of the 20th century, where automation most heavily impacted medium-income/skill jobs. The bias towards highly skilled workers suggests a discontinuity with this trend and an end to job polarization. More and more, companies will compete to attract and retain agile, highly skilled workers. Low-skill workers will experience stagnating or falling wages and employment opportunities, and will be forced to acquire the necessary skills to reallocate towards jobs that are less susceptible to automation.

So, what's the score?

While the technical potential for automation is considerable and will inevitably increase as technology advances, technological possibility is no guarantee for technological reality. The adoption of new technologies and the pace and extent to which these technologies will complement or replace human labor, depend on a variety of factors, such as the relative cost and benefits of automation and human labor, the availability of skills on the labor market and regulatory & social acceptance.

Nevertheless, the impact of the Fourth Industrial Revolution will be significant, and it will fundamentally alter the nature of work and the workplace itself. Both businesses and workers will have to adapt, if they are to thrive in a rapidly changing, technology-driven world.
